Anne's dad, George, died of pancreatic cancer. My brother, Don, died of AIDS. My folks, heart disease. Most recently, my sister, Carol, has battled mightily with a ruptured gall bladder, then with a brain tumor, and now with breast cancer. Enough!

These encounters with death and disease have brought about a reordering of my priorities. I don't "sweat the small stuff" any more.

And most of it *IS* small stuff.

So instead of sweating, I pray. Prayer shapes and guides my life much more than it did before death and disease took hold of my clan. And it's not just for me and my family — now I spend a good deal of time in intercessory prayer for *you*.

Last month, Tom Biscelgia passed, which sent the family reeling. Many of us know the pain.

Then Bob Farley went under the surgeon's knife for the fourth time, not knowing if he would wake up. Some of you know that drill too.

And what did I do? More than anything, I prayed.

When I encounter people struggling with any issue at all, I pray for them. And I'm trying to be more intentional about telling them so. I know how it lifts *my* spirits when I'm told by someone that I am being prayed for.

I'm reading a book now by journalist Tim Madigan (*I'm Proud*

*of You: Life Lessons From My Friend Fred Rogers*) about the famous Fred Rogers, better known to his friends in the neighborhood as *Mr. Rogers*. In addition to being a creative TV personality and beacon for millions of little kids, Fred Rogers was also an ordained Presbyterian minister. And he was a huge pray-er too.

But what I find so fascinating about Rogers was his unfailing willingness to ask others to pray for *him*.

Might've had something to do with his success.

So, I'm taking a lesson. As a pastor, husband, parent, and friend, I'm trying to encourage those who might need to know that someone is thinking about them and praying for them. Notes, phone calls and, most especially, emails! I know how they can make the spirit soar!

And, like Fred Rogers, I'm asking each of you to pray for me too.

Let's be Christ for one another. Let's be quick with encouragement — through spoken or written word, through deeds however small or gracious, through prayer, and through the simple kindness of sincere acknowledgement:

*"I know this is a difficult time for you and I am holding you in daily prayer."*

What better way to carry out Christ's command: *love one another*.

## SEPTEMBER 6

Proverbs 22:1-2, 8-9, 22-23

1A good name is to be chosen rather than great riches, and favor is better than silver or gold. 2The rich and the poor have this in common: the LORD is the maker of them all.

8Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity, and the rod of anger will fail. 9Those who are generous are blessed, for they share their bread with the poor.

22Do not rob the poor because they are poor, or crush the afflicted at the gate; 23for the LORD pleads their cause and despoils of life those who despoil them.

## SEPTEMBER 13

Mark 8:27-38

27Jesus went on with his disciples to the villages of Caesarea Philippi; and on the way he asked his disciples, "Who do people say that I am?" 28And they answered him, "John the Baptist; and others, Elijah; and still others, one of the prophets." 29He asked them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered him, "You are the Messiah." 30And he sternly ordered them not to tell anyone about him.

31Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. 32He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. 33But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, "Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things."

34He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. 35For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. 36For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? 37Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? 38Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels."

## SEPTEMBER 20

James 3:13-4:3, 7-8a

13Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. 14But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. 15Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. 16For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. 17But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. 18And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace.

4:1Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? 2You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. 3You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures.

7Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. 8Draw near to God and he will draw near to you.

38John said to him, "Teacher, we saw someone casting out demons in your name, and we tried to stop him, because he was not following us." 39But Jesus said, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. 40Whoever is not against us is for us. 41For truly I tell you, whoever gives you a cup of water to drink because you bear the name of Christ will by no means lose the reward.

42"If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea. 43If your hand causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life maimed than to have two hands and to go to hell, to the unquenchable fire. 45And if your foot causes you to stumble, cut it off; it is better for you to enter life lame than to have two feet and to be thrown into hell. 47And if your eye causes you to stumble, tear it out; it is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than to have two eyes and to be thrown into hell, 48where their worm never dies, and the fire is never quenched.

49"For everyone will be salted with fire. 50Salt is good; but if salt has lost its saltiness, how can you season it? Have salt in yourselves, and be at peace with one another."

## Energy Outreach Colorado

Did you know that CM has a grant from EOC to help people with energy assistance? The following is a story about one of our clients.

Gina C. is used to hard luck, so she was floored when she received assistance to pay the energy bill for her modest Denver apartment.

"It felt like a miracle to me," said the 39-year-old, who gets by on \$600 in monthly disability income. "Nothing this good has ever happened to me before." When faced with having her home energy disconnected, Gina sought help from Community Ministry of Southwest Denver, which paid a portion of her energy bill through a grant from Energy Outreach Colorado.

Gina has not been able to work since 2004, when she was splattered with boiling water while sterilizing equipment. The accident resulted in third-degree burns to her arms. She's undergone numerous painful surgeries and skin grafts but still has open wounds that require constant care and severely restrict the movement of her hands and wrists.

Gina receives help from her mother to care for her three children aged 22, 16 and 15, and attends therapy both to heal her body and mentally overcome the trauma of the past. A nurse visits weekly to change her dressings.

"I hope that someday I'm in the position to help somebody else," she said. "There's a long list of people who need the kind of help I've been blessed to receive."

# It's Good to Grow!

## Thoughts from the Church Growth Committee ...

If I were looking for a church to attend in the morning, here are 16 things I'd look for . . . .

1. When I enter do I hear laughter?
2. Are people greeting me as a job or a joy?
3. Does the place look like they were expecting me?
4. Are people buzzing as they greet each other?
5. Is there spirited music playing as people gather?
6. Does the music move me?
7. Do the people on stage look real and engaged?
8. Are the announcements short, strategic, and to the point?
9. Is there a printed bulletin with Scripture already printed on it?
10. Does the pastor smile?
11. Does the message title promise a relevant topic I am interested in?
12. Does the pastor speak with humility and authority?
13. Do I feel the presence of God?
14. Are people listening and engaged?
15. Is the service no more than 71 minutes?
16. Does it pass by fast?

## How to Find a Good Church

It goes without saying that every believer should have a church home where they attend regularly. If you know someone who is not a part of such a fellowship, the following advice may be of help to them:

**1. Look for a church prayerfully.** As is the case with all others aspects of a Christian's decisions, you should begin your search for a church by seeking the Lord's direction. The Bible promises, "In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths" (Prov. 3:6).

**2. Search for prospects.** You might look for listings in the newspaper or in the yellow pages. Always seek the congregation which is Bible-based. A referral from a trusted Christian friend is the most frequent way people are introduced to a church. A visit or two is helpful, but there is no way to fully evaluate a church without attending most services for a month or so.

**3. Keep in mind that you're looking for a fellowship of believers.** A church is not a building, nor is it merely a ministry, it is the body of Christ. So seek people who love the Lord and who love each other -- people that will love you and people to whom you can give your love.

**4. Look for the church that preaches the Word of God.** -- Seek a fellowship that has sound doctrine, proclaims the Word, and sincerely lifts up the Lord Jesus Christ in worship and in all they do.



**5. Look for a church that has good character.** Seek a loving, peaceful, stable church which has a pastor devoted to godliness, prayer and the word, which are more important than his eloquence, education or charisma.

**6. Look for a church that will help draw you closer to Christ.** It might be nice to find a church where the music is flawless, where the seats are padded and the minister dismisses promptly after one hour. But more importantly, you need a church that cares about you and who will help meet your spiritual needs -- that will inspire you to grow in Christ, and will motivate you toward the aspirations of God. You need a church whose preaching and teaching will not merely appease or entertain you, but will boldly challenge you to advance beyond your comfort zones to live toward God's high ideals.

**7. Look for a church where you can become committed.** In many ways, your relationship with the church is similar to a marriage -- you can't get any more out of it than what you put into it. The only church in which you will ever grow and mature spiritually is the fellowship where you will commit yourself and get involved -- where the people submit themselves to God and to each other -- where they will both encourage you and hold you accountable.

**8. Seek a fellowship that is attempting to reach lost souls.** Find the fellowship that is seeking to bring lives to Christ, both in their community and on foreign mission fields. Such a church understands its purpose and will provide a healthy environment in which to grow.

**9. Look for a church where you can contribute.** I've often heard the comparison made between a church and a restaurant -- a place where you get served a meal. But actually, the church is more like a pot luck dinner. What you bring with you to church is added to the content of the meal. Your contribution to the gathering helps to make it what it is. Therefore, seek the church where you can roll up your sleeves and help them to minister to others. Don't look for a church that will only "serve you," but look for a church in which you can "serve." Always remember, a church is the combination of what its people are. So if you want your church to be the best it can be, you must be the best you can be. A church can never rise above what its individual members are.

**10. Be ready to accept the individuality of a church.** Frequently people look for a church like the one in which they got saved, or like one they see on TV. But this is futile, because even though a church might have the same beliefs or similarities as another, every church is distinct and different in its personality, just like people are. Always use the Bible as the standard to measure a church -- not other churches.

**11. Look for a church with reasonable expectations.** Don't bother looking for a perfect church, because there aren't any. In every church you will find people who are wonderful and some who aren't. Jesus taught that it was common for weeds to be found growing together with the crops (Matt. 13:24-30). Also, in every church, you'll find some things done well, and others that are not. Don't worry about finding a perfect pastor, either. Trust me, they're all human and will make mistakes. But look for a pastor who is sincere, who is trying his best to live a godly moral life, and who is proclaiming the Word of God. In short, be content with the church that is doing the best they can.

There are many good churches! Trust the Lord to guide you to the fellowship where he wants you, and become faithful there. Don't be a church hopper -- bouncing around to one church after another each week. God wants you to be submitted to the accountability of spiritual leaders who will help you and even correct you when necessary (Heb. 13:17), and this isn't possible unless you are rooted somewhere. Don't have a neglectful attitude, going to church only when you feel like it. Attend faithfully and show up on time. Serve your church at least as diligently as you would your employer. Remember, the Lord views your attitude toward His church as your attitude toward Him (Matt. 25:40), so serve the Lord in a way that if God were your employer, you wouldn't get fired!

## Changing church paradigms

### OLDER CONGREGATION RAISES YOUNG CHILDREN

...Then Abraham fell on his face and laughed, and said to himself, "Shall a child be born to a man who is a hundred years old? Shall Sarah, who is ninety years old, bear a child?" (Genesis 17:17 NRSV)

For Abraham and Sarah, we all too often jump straight to the story of Isaac, forgetting how shocking a child was to this couple that had completely come to accept their barrenness. Children are both a blessing and a miracle as they give us vitality. However, for many of our congregations the thought of ministering to children has become a distant hope in their barrenness as they, like Abraham and Sarah, age past the time of child rearing.

Our first thought of regaining children within the congregation is logically toward attracting young families, while still anxious about outdated hopes of gilded ages past when people (and money) were plentiful.

For the First Church of Fairborn, Ohio, a middle class, white collar, suburban congregation of Dayton, the past had taught them that ministry started with young families. Yet, as the demographics of the town changed (homeowners in town became home renters, and church members started coming from places other than this onetime premier suburb) the likelihood of younger members went the way of many churches. Children grew up and moved away, new children did not come, the area changed, and the church remained, much older now without critical mass for children's ministry. First Church, anxious by the insecurity of its barren pews, prayed God would bring them children again. Their deepest hopes mimicked that of Abraham and Sarah desiring what they did not have and saddened by thoughts of those they knew were unlikely to return.

Like Abraham and Sarah, God answered their prayers in a different way than convention would suggest.

The church sits on the north end of Maple Street and on the south end of Maple Street is a school with the distinction of being the largest primary school in five states with more than 1,600 students. Budget difficulties and consolidations have brought all of the city's kindergarten through third graders under one roof. More than half of the students live in households with an income low enough to qualify them for subsidized breakfast and lunch. The material need of these children is great as well as their filial need of stable hands for their care.

For a congregation of grandparents, and a community of children needing grandparents, the match was, shall we say, made in heaven. As some of the church members volunteered in the school's reading programs, they became aware of the needs of this elementary community. They learned that it takes way too long for the nurse to reach an injured child on the playground, go back to the clinic for equipment and then back to the child through the one and a half miles of hallways set end to end. The church pooled its money and bought the school a golf cart. This life-giving resource also became a lifeline for a child with spinal bifida to travel through the school to activities previously unreachable.

The gift of the golf cart was only the beginning. To help the understaffed school, the church members formed a "Helping Hands" ministry taking new youngsters from the buses to their classes at the start of the day and from class to the bus at the end of the day for the first two weeks of school as children learned their routes. Church members donated medical supplies for the under-stocked school clinic. One church member contacted a local hairdresser who donated a barber's chair and free haircuts for children who needed this service. The city provided only one librarian for its four schools, so the members became librarians. In finding that many of the children did not have proper clothing, the members of the church donated clothes and opened a small "boutique" in the school giving children adequate apparel.

As the church met these needs, others became apparent. Many students got sick because they did not have blankets to keep them warm at night. Getting material donated from a local business, the church made blankets. The church donated money to bring a traveling science exhibit from Columbus for the whole third grade's edification. They also helped to fund a trip to a local university for the second graders to see a live theater production. Surprisingly by God's grace, all of these things and more have happened within the last twelve months.

First Church asked God for children and God gave children. Only God gave them children from outside of the typical models of young families and bustling Sunday School classrooms. Instead, God brought this church into community with children who were not their own and needed to be found outside of its building. This partnership along Maple Street in Fairborn is an answer to prayer, yet an answer that was within God's will and God's time. God is blessing the primary school students and their families through this ministry and the older congregation as well giving them new energy and meaningful purpose in this service. Like Abraham and Sarah, the aged church received children from God and in transforming the school they are changing the future by God's blessing.
